History of National Golf Month

It was the Professional Golfers Association of America (P.G.A.) who founded the first National Golf Month back in August 1993. The purpose of this was to promote golf as a family-friendly and inclusive sport that could be accessible to all ages, genders, and skill levels. Initially, the P.G.A. used to host an annual charity event on National Golf Day (which falls on a different day each year), and due to the success of this, they decided to make the entire month a promotion and celebration of the sport.

Although most historians would agree on the fact that the modern-day version of golf (involving 18 holes) originated in Scotland in the 1400s, there are some who contest this. Some versions of golf can be traced back to The Netherlands (the 1200s), while at the same time, there is still some debate about the origins of golf tracing back all the way to the Roman Empire. The Roman game referred to was called 'paganica,' and it involved the use of a bent stick to hit a wool or feather-stuffed leather ball. Since the Roman Empire had so much influence across Europe, it is thought that 'paganica' spread and evolved this way. Still, others say that the Chinese game of 'chuiwan,' played during the Ming Dynasty (1368-1644), was the original, which spanned the evolution of the sport as we know it today.

Many decide to go with the theory of Scottish origins based on the fact that it involved knocking a ball into a hole, as well as being called 'golf.' A 1457 Act of the Scottish Parliament even banned golf as a sport because King James II of Scotland considered it a distraction from military training. However, it quickly became popular with future monarchs, including Mary Queen of Scots, and by the 1900s, more than 1000 golf clubs were established in the U.S. alone. Through major funding and sponsorship, the U.S. quickly became the epicenter of professional golf. However, the oldest golf tournament still takes place at the Prestwick Golf Club in Ayrshire, Scotland.

Something very special happened on Wednesday. It may not have been a BTC event but quite a few BTC members were present. We were playing golf at Deer Creek. My group was on the par 3 eighth hole. The hole was cut at the front right as 27-year BTC Member **Bob Vizdal** stepped up to the tee with his 5 iron in hand. He hit it pure, it soared high and majestic, landed soft, then rolled up to the cup, fell in over the front edge and then rested comfortably at the bottom of the cup. It has finally happened. Bob Vizdal at age 76 finally has his first hole in one. Congratulations Bob! Why 18 Holes?



Why couldn't golf courses have 10 or 13 or 21 holes?

Answer: Well, it seems that in the year of 1858, the board of St. Andrews in Scottland sat all day settling this very question. There were then 7-hole courses, 13-hole courses, and 15-hole courses. At one time St. Andrews itself was made up of 22 holes and Montrose had 25.

Finally, after a full day's discussion, it is said that one of the Scottish members of the board and a member in good standing spoke as follows:

"Well, you good gentlemen have been considering this situation for many hours and I have been hoping you would decide along lines agreeable to me without any insistence on my part. I see, however, that I must speak for myself.

As you know, it has long been my custom to start the game of golf with a full bottle of Martin's Scotch Whisky in my bag - not, you understand, for any reason except that the inclemency of our local climate makes it expedient for me to have a small medicinal nip on each tee.

Now, gentlemen, I have here a small glass, which contains about an ounce and a half when not filled so full that a drop may escape. Naturally I find it pleasant to play golf so long as there is a drink left in the bottle. On the other hand, it would be unhealthy for me to continue the game when the bottle is exhausted.
